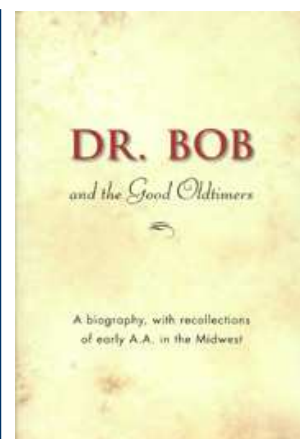

This book attempts to give a portrait of Dr. Bob as full-scale and balanced as possible, for the most part, in the words of those who knew him personally. The youngster who grew up in Vermont of the late 19th century became a hard-drinking college boy, then a medical student fighting the onset of his own alcoholism, a respected physician, a loving but increasingly unreliable family man, and at last a desperately ill drunk, without hope until he met a stockbroker from New York-Bill W., who urgently needed a fellow alcoholic to help him maintain his own sobriety.

- Income
- Total Income for January exceeded budget projections by roughly \$700. Group contributions and our new item, Medallion sales, exceeded projections. All other income items, including individual contributions, Fivers & Birthdays, were below projections.

 - Decreased AAWS literature sales; \$6,947.27 actual vs \$7,625 projected.

Expense

- Office expense was exceeded by roughly \$700+; increases were in postage & delivery and replenishment of office supplies primarily.
- Other Committee expense was exceeded by almost \$1,000 due to an initial PI/CPC cost of over \$1,566.
- Clerical Payroll expenses were over by \$700; \$3,390 vs \$2,667 projected due primarily to year-end closing workload.
- Total Expenses for the month were \$15,436 versus \$13,455 budgeted.
- Resulting Net Income for the month was \$(2,462).

- Not All "A.A. Literature" is Conference-Approved
 - Central offices and intergroups do write and distribute pamphlets or booklets that are not Conference-approved. If such pieces meet the needs of the local membership, they may be legitimately classified as "A.A. literature." There is no conflict between A.A. World Services, Inc. (A.A.W.S. – publishers of Conference-approved literature), and central offices or intergroups – rather they complement each other. The Conference does not disapprove of such material. (Service material from the General Service Office)

Ivo: has been in the ICU at Mercy hospital for over three weeks fighting to recover from his surgery. Our prayers are with him.

Greg and Judy: 1st time visitors – welcome.

Paul: hit 5 libraries, 14 hospitals and clinics, 3 schools, and 1 coffee shop in the Woodland, Yolo areas. He totaled 78 different locations—great job again! He also provided the group with 10 stamps (Alcoholics Anonymous hotline and website). He was able to purchase these at a great price through VistaPrint.com.

Tim: worked the downtown Sacramento area delivering literature to C.A.R.E.S. (Center for Aids Research and Education). He also placed some special literature at the "Gay and Lesbian Center" and related service agencies. Tim also made contact with Dr. Jody Gordon at the 2801 K St. Sutter Medical Center. Dr. Gordon was the former Medical Director at C.A.R.E.S. Tim helped Chuck bring in another ton of literature and racks for the group.

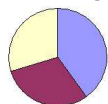

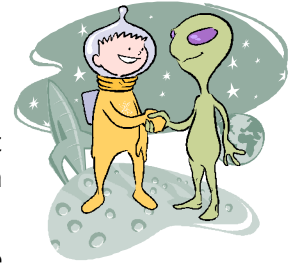

The newcomer laughed. Our old-timer is at least 55 years of age. It's a joy watching them develop a friendship. As the Big Book says, "We are people who normally would not mix. But there exists among us a fellowship, and friendliness, and an understanding which is indescribably wonderful."

The Nonalcoholic Addict

Many treatment centers today combine alcohol and other drug addictions under “substance abuse” or “chemical dependence.” Patients (both alcoholic and nonalcoholic) are introduced to AA and encouraged to attend AA on the “outside” when they leave. Anyone may attend an open meeting of AA. But only persons with a drinking problem may attend closed meetings or become AA members. Dually or multiply addicted people are eligible for AA membership only if one of their addictions is to alcohol.

Dr. Vincent Dole, a pioneer in methadone treatment for heroin addicts and for several years a trustee on the General Service Board of AA, made the following statement: “The source of strength in AA is its single-mindedness. The mission of AA is to help alcoholics. AA limits what it is demanding of itself and its associates, and its success lies in its limited target. To believe that the process that is successful in one line guarantees success for another would be a very serious mistake.” Consequently, we welcome the opportunity to share AA experience with those who would like to develop self-help programs for the nonalcoholic addict using AA methods perhaps, but using the experience of the nonalcoholic addict during drug addiction and recovery.

The following excerpts from a Grapevine article by AA’s co-founder Bill W. represent principles which have been reaffirmed by the members of the AA General Service Conferences of 1969, 1970 and 1972.

- “The problem of drug addiction in its several forms lies close to us all. It stirs our deepest interest and sympathy. Many AA’s, especially those who have suffered these particular addictions, are now asking, ‘What can we do about drugs—within our Fellowship, and without?’
- “Specifically, here is a list of questions we are often asked:

1 “Can a nonalcoholic pill or drug addict become an AA member?	No.
2 “Can such a person be brought, as a visitor, to an open AA meeting for help and inspiration?	Yes.
3 “If so, should these nonalcoholic pill or drug users be led to believe that they have become AA members?	No.
1 “Can a pill or drug taker, who also has a genuine alcoholic history, become a member of AA?	Yes.
- “Now there are certain things that AA cannot do for anybody, regardless of what our desires or sympathies may be. Our first duty, as a fellowship, is to insure our own survival. Therefore, we have to avoid distractions and multipurpose activity.
- “Sobriety—freedom from alcohol—through the teaching and practice of the Twelve Steps, is the sole purpose of an AA group. Groups have repeatedly tried other activities, and they have always failed. It has also been learned that there is no possibly way to make nonalcoholics into AA members. We have to confine our membership to alcoholics, and we have to confine our AA groups to a single purpose. If we don’t stick to these principles, we shall almost surely collapse. And if we collapse, we cannot help anyone.
- “I see no way of making nonalcoholic addicts into AA members. Experience says loudly that we can admit no exceptions, even though drug users and alcoholics happen to be first cousins of a sort. If we persist in trying this, I’m afraid it will be hard on the drug user himself, as well as on AA. We must accept the fact that no nonalcoholic, whatever his affliction, can be converted into an alcoholic ... and an AA member.
- “We cannot give AA membership to nonalcoholic addicts. But, like anyone else, they should be able to attend open AA meetings, provided, of course, that the groups themselves are willing.

Don't Let the Little Things Pile Up

Several years ago, a man started to walk across the United States from California to New York. When he reached New York, a group of newspaper reporters met him and asked him about his experiences – they wanted to know if he suffered any handicaps. Finally, one reporter asked him what his most difficult problem was and what advice he would give to any person who is planning to cross the United States on foot.

The traveler thought for what seemed to be a long time before he gave his answer. Perhaps he was thinking of the arduous journey over the hot sand or the torrent of rainstorms he encountered and could not find shelter to protect himself. But, instead he quietly said, “I would say my greatest problem was the sand that got into my shoes.”

It was indeed the small grains of sand in his shoes that gave him the most trouble – not the hot paved road – not the stones which he stumbled over and bruised his shins. It was not the hot sun that beat down on him as he crossed the hot desert. It was the tiny grains of sand in his shoes that gave him the most pain – small grains of sand that ground their way into the pores of his feet and made each step an agony.

Most of us, who attend AA meetings with some regularity, have heard most of the speakers and individuals warn all of us about letting the little things pile up. Yet, some members will let the little things come to a boiling point until their mental lid pops over. Then, they say and do things that they would not do or say under normal circumstances.

It is not the great sorrows, failures, defeats, disappointments and the crisis in man's life that crush him. Most often, it is the constant irritation of little things that are insignificant in themselves, but when allowed to multiply, they wear burning blisters on his soul and sap all the joy out of his life.

Life is full of little things – full of small pains, irritations, resentments, and petty grievances which a little patience can cure. Every human being will be called upon to endure some large tragedy in his life. This is the penalty we all have to pay for living in this world, but the men and women who will pay the price and accept the will of God will come out stronger in character. We know of some members in AA, who suffered the sudden loss of a loved one, but endured the blow and came out stronger in spirit. We see other members rise about great disappointments and failures and, when overwhelming sorrow came, it drew them closer. We also saw some members let the dangerous little things add up until they became monsters of moral and spiritual destruction.

Most of the prisoners in penal institutions are there because of small things: domestic wrangling, insulting remarks, barroom bravado, disparaging and rude actions. These are only some of the little things that lead to alcohol, assault, and even murder.

We are only in this world for a short time and we can lose many precious hours by letting the small things grow into mountains over which we have control if we do not take that first drink. Few of us are cruelly or greatly wronged. It is the small blows to our self-esteem, the indignities, and the little jolts to our vanity which causes much of the heartaches in this world. It is not the single drop of water that causes our nerves to become taut – it is the continual dripping that makes us snap.
